1. On 4 October 2021, Trial Chamber I (the 'Chamber') issued the 'Directions on the conduct of proceedings'.<sup>1</sup>

2. On 15 December 2022, the Chamber issued its 'Second Directions on the Conduct of Proceedings'.<sup>2</sup>

3. On 24 January 2023, the Chamber indicated that it would file an addendum to the aforesaid Directions on the Conduct of Proceedings, setting out the procedure for an eventual motion of acquittal.<sup>3</sup>

4. In its Second Directions on the Conduct of Proceedings, the Chamber, bearing in mind the estimated end of the Prosecution's case at the time, as well as the Defence's indication that it might file a 'no case to answer motion', set the deadline of 1 March 2023 for the Defence to file any request for leave to file such a motion.<sup>4</sup>

5. Accordingly, the Chamber modifies the aforesaid deadline and provides the following directions in relation to an eventual motion for acquittal.

6. The Defence shall file an application for leave to present a motion for acquittal, no later than 5 days after the close of the Prosecution's case.<sup>5</sup> The Trial Chamber will decide in its discretion whether to grant leave.

7. Should leave be refused, the decision shall not contain any assessment of evidence.

8. If the Chamber grants leave, the following procedure applies:

- a) The Defence shall file the appropriate motion in writing, within 5 days, stating its grounds in support. The written document shall not exceed 5 pages.
- b) The Prosecutor and common legal representatives of victims may respond within 5 days of receipt of the Defence submissions. Their written submissions shall not exceed 5 pages.
- c) Thereafter, the Trial Chamber will hold a hearing within 14 days of receipt of the responses. If necessary, the Trial Chamber may call for written submissions prior to the hearing.
- d) A decision rejecting the motion shall be filed within 14 days of the hearing.

9. Where the issue of acquittal is notified to the parties by the Chamber *propio motu*, the Chamber shall indicate the charges on which it seeks submissions. Thereafter the parties and legal representatives of victims shall file observations within 30 days of receipt of the Chamber's notification. A hearing shall be held within 30 days of the filing of the submissions.
