Student Resource Officers (SROs) are on school campuses daily throughout Midland County greeting students and being available to students, parents, and staff. They are guest speakers in classrooms, provide DARE programs to fifth graders, and are present at big activities like football games and graduation. Parents, students, and staff have learned that they can bring concerns they have to the SROs. They build positive relationships daily that help students feel comfortable speaking up when they know someone is making bad decisions or might harm themselves or when they need help themselves.

“The success of the SRO program is all about the relationships. Without the SROs it’s likely that the only contact many students have with a law enforcement officer is likely to be negative. SROs provide a wonderful opportunity to build positive relationships,” said Shawn Hale, Bullock Creek School District Superintendent.

SROs are carefully selected and provided extensive training that includes ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate), RAIDER Training (Solo Response to Active Shooter), Crime Prevention by Environmental Design, Pistol and Rifle Trained Instructors and DARE. The SROs work closely with the schools on their security assessments and Emergency Operations Plans as well as observe and assess on-site drills. SROs patrol the campus daily looking for ways to improve safety.

During the school day while the SROs are on campus and they are also connected with what is happening in the community and can help the school react quickly if something has the potential to negatively impact the students. Prior to having SROs on campus when a law enforcement officer was needed the road patrol deputies responded taking them away from their other duties. Now, the road patrol remains fully staffed and when school is out the SROs at the county schools return to road patrol providing additional officers.

During the first three years of the SRO program in the Bullock Creek, Meridian, and Coleman schools the deputies made an impact on thousands of students. The deputies have recorded over 7,000 contacts with students, staff and parents that went beyond a casual conversation. Sheriff Greene provided the following statistics.

- 3380 Contacts with Students
- 2630 Contacts with School Staff
- 1073 Contacts with Parents
- 73 Presentations on Health and/or Safety
- 115 General Presentations
- 158 DARE Presentations
- 251 Responses to Complaints
- 80 Special Functions Attended

Following high profile events in schools around the country “The presence of the officers in our building also reduces a lot of stress and anxiety for our staff,” said Jennifer McCormack, Coleman Public Schools Superintendent. “We were able to immediately have meetings with our staff where they could hear from the officer that we are doing everything we can, that we are safe and if they need him, he will come through and give them more pointers. You can feel it in the room, the worry diminishes.”

In November 2018, Midland County voters overwhelmingly approved a millage proposal to fund the placement of SROs into all Midland County school districts. From 2009 – 2018 the Midland Police Department provided two SROs to Midland Public Schools and the new program covered the funding for the two existing SROs and two additional officers at Midland Public Schools middle schools plus three Midland County Sheriff’s Office deputies for the Bullock Creek, Meridian, and Coleman schools. Funding of the SRO program for 2022 – 2026 requires voter approval during the primary election on August 2nd. Learn more about the proposed millage renewal on [page 8](#).

Fall/Winter COVID-19 Surge

Many experts, including the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, are predicting a major COVID-19 outbreak later this year, likely in the late fall or winter. This is due to a number of factors including waning immunity, evolution of variants and increased indoor activity.

Booster Shots for the Fall of 2022

FDA Advisors (FDA VRBPAC) met on June 28, 2022 and recommended updating booster shots to include the current vaccine SARS-CoV-2 strain and target omicron, the COVID-19 variant that has been dominant in 2022. The panel did not provide a specific recommendation about the omicron composition of the booster. The subvariants of Omicron, BA.4 and BA.5, now make up more than half of the COVID-19 cases in the US and over 56% of cases in our Midwest region as of June 25, 2022. The panel did not review who might be eligible for the boosters, but it is anticipated that older Americans would be amongst the first groups eligible for the combination boosters.

COVID-19 Vaccination Recommended for those age 6 Months and Older

COVID-19 Boosters Recommended for those age 5 and Older

All Americans ages 6 months and older are now eligible for COVID-19 vaccination. On Saturday, June 18, 2022, the CDC endorsed the ACIP recommendation that all children 6 months through 5 years of age should receive a COVID-19 vaccine.

On May 19, 2022, the CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices' (ACIP) expanded eligibility of COVID-19 vaccine boosters to everyone 5 years of age and older. Children ages 5 through 11 years should receive a booster shot 5 months after their initial Pfizer-BioNTech vaccination series.

Second booster shots: Recommended at least four months after the first booster shot for those who are age 50 and older and for those 12 and older who are immunocompromised. Many older Americans received their last dose of the primary vaccine series early in 2021. A booster is required for improved protection against severe disease, hospitalization and death.

COVID-19 is not expected to take a summer vacation. The Midland County Department of Public Health (MCDPH) urges everyone to stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccinations. **MCDPH continues to host weekly COVID vaccine clinics for everyone 6 months and older on Tuesdays from 10am-4:30pm.**

COVID-19 Update - Continued

Evolving Understanding of COVID-19

- The definition of close contact, < 6 feet + > 15 minutes, was initially a useful parameter for contact tracing and is still a useful guidance for notification of your close contacts should you become infected. Contagiousness of the SARS-CoV-2 virus has been increasing as new variants emerge. Exposure is now more of a continuum of risk. Proximity and duration are still important, but so is the setting, including crowding, loud speech/singing, coughing/sneezing, ventilation, and masking quality. Bottom line: COVID-19 is possible from exposures greater than 6 feet away and/or less than 15 minutes of exposure.
- The current COVID-19 isolation period is 5 days and then masking when in public and no travel through day 10. However, there is now often a delay between onset of symptoms and a positive antigen test, with negative antigen tests now more common early in the course of illness. Positive antigen tests often continue through 8 – 10 days or more. It is possible that people remain contagious after the isolation period ends. It is crucial to be meticulous about wearing masks in public and avoid traveling through 10 days, unless there are two negative tests 24 hours apart.
- No retest for 90 days after infection is outdated. Since omicron, MCDPH is aware of many people who have had COVID-19 twice within a month or two.
- While the COVID-19 vaccine “initial series” is still equated to being “fully vaccinated”, waning immunity and continued emergence of COVID-19 variants requires boosters for maximum protection against severe disease, hospitalization and death. It is vital to stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccine booster doses.
- The current CDC masking recommendations, 200 cases per 100,000 + 10 hospital admissions per 100,000 = mask, are meant to protect critical infrastructure, not people from contracting COVID-19. The initial CDC criteria for high COVID-19 transmission was 100 cases per 100,000 and masking was recommended when substantial transmission was reached at 50 cases per 100,000 population. At this time, much of COVID-19 is relatively mild and people testing positive on a home test are not counted in officially reported case numbers. In addition, the variants have become more transmissible. A practical guestimate is to multiply the official number of COVID-19 cases in the county/region by a factor of 10 to have a more realistic estimate of the COVID-19 burden in your community.

Michigan Primary Election August 2nd

The 2022 Michigan Primary Elections are Tuesday August 2nd. The State of Michigan is a closed primary this means you can only vote for candidates within one political party you may not “split your ticket” in the primary. If you split your ticket nothing on the ballot will count and you will have to get a new ballot. All candidates are on one ballot, and you do not have to “declare” which party you will be voting for.

You may register to vote by any manner up until July 18th and at your clerk’s office up through election day. After registering, you can vote an absent voter ballot at the clerk’s office, or you can vote at your polling place on Election Day. For more information on registering to vote [click here](#).

Any registered voter may request an absentee ballot. Applications can be made [online](#) or at your clerk’s office. Due to postal delays, it is recommended that applications via mail be posted no later than two weeks prior to the election. Within two weeks of the election, it is recommended that you request your ballot in person at your clerk’s office. Your completed absentee ballot should be received by your city or township clerk by 8 p.m. on Election Day.

There are numerous County-wide proposals on the ballot they are as follows:

COUNTYWIDE PROPOSALS:

MIDLAND COUNTY EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS) MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

“For the purpose of continuing to provide funding for emergency medical services and transportation. shall the County of Midland renew the previously approved increase in the limitation of the total amount of general ad-valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes upon all taxable real and personal property in Midland County, as authorized by Article 9, Section 6 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, for levy up to .65 Mill (\$0.65 per \$1,000) of taxable valuation on such property as finally equalized during the years 2023- 2026 , both inclusive, which if approved and levied in its entirety is estimated to raise \$2,421 ,605 in the first year?”

MIDLAND COUNTY SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER (SRO) MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

“For the purpose of continuing the placement of licensed law enforcement officers from the Midland County Sheriff’s Office and the Midland City Police Department as School resource Officers to public schools in Midland County(Midland Public, Meridian, Bullock Creek, and Coleman) who will provide school security, law enforcement, and facilitate educational liaison between students, school staff, law enforcement officers, and the community, shall the County

of Midland renew the previously approved increase in the limitation of the total amount of general ad-valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes upon all taxable real and personal property in Midland County, as authorized by Article 9, Section 6 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, be renewed for levy up to .4 Mill (\$0.40 per \$1,000) of taxable valuation on such property as finally equalized during the years 2022- 2026, both inclusive, which if approved and levied in its entirety is estimated to raise \$1,488,680 in the first year?”

SERVICES TO OLDER CITIZENS RENEWAL MILLAGE PROPOSAL

“For the purpose of continuing to provide services to older citizens (60 years or older) in Midland County through the Council on Aging (an agency authorized by 1976 Public Act No. 39), shall the County of Midland renew the previously approved increase in the limitation of the total amount of general ad-valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes upon all taxable real and personal property in Midland County, as authorized by Article 9, Section 6 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, for levy up to 0.9 Mill (\$0.90 per \$1,000) of taxable valuation on such property as finally equalized during the years 2022- 2026, both inclusive, which if approved and levied in its entirety is estimated to raise \$3,350,530 in the first year?”

2022 ROAD MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

"For the purpose of continuing funding for Midland County Road Commission programs that construct, maintain, repair and improve highway, road, street, and bridge systems within the County of Midland, including the Cities of Midland and Coleman, and the Village of Sanford, shall the County of Midland renew the previously approved increase in the limitation of the total amount of general ad-valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes upon all taxable real and personal property in Midland County, as authorized by Article 9, Section 6 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, which last resulted in a levy of 1.00 Mill, and continue to levy up to 1.00 Mill (\$1.00 per \$1,000) of taxable valuation on such property as finally equalized during the years 2023 - 2026, both inclusive, which if approved and levied in its entirety is estimated to raise \$3,691,700 in the first year?"

SPONGY MOTH (FORMERLY GYPSY MOTH) MILLAGE RENEWAL AND INCREASE PROPOSAL

"For the purpose of continuing funding to monitor and control the spongy moth caused defoliation by aerial spraying of B.t. (*Bacillus thuringiensis*) or other natural products, shall the previously approved increase in the limitation of the total amount of general ad-valorem taxes which may be imposed for all purposes upon all taxable real and personal property in Midland County, as authorized by Article 9, § 6, of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, be renewed and increased for a levy up to 0.40 Mill (\$0.40 per \$1000) of taxable valuation as finally equalized for levy in the years 2023 - 2026, both inclusive, which if approved and levied in its entirety, is estimated to raise \$1,488,680 in the first year?"

TOWNSHIP PROPOSALS:

PORTER TOWNSHIP PROPOSAL NO. 1 ROAD MILLAGE RENEWAL

This millage proposal would allow the Township of Porter to renew its previously authorized levy of one (1.0) mill on taxable property in the Township of Porter for the purpose of maintenance and improvement of roads in the Township. The present authorized levy expired in 2021. Revenue from this millage will be disbursed to the Midland County Road Commission which shall perform the maintenance and improvements.

Shall the Township of Porter, Midland County, Michigan, renew the existing millage, which last resulted in a levy of 1.0 mill (\$1.00 per \$1,000.00) of taxable valuation as finally equalized, as provided in Article 9, Section 6, of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, as amended, for a total levy of one ("1.0) mills (\$1.00 per \$1,000.00) of taxable valuation as finally equalized, for a period of four (4) years (2022 through 2025, inclusive), which levy would provide estimated revenues to the Township of \$39,681.00 in its first year if approved and levied, for the purpose of maintenance and improvement of roads and public rights of way within the Township?

SCHOOL DISTRICT PROPOSALS:

MIDLAND COUNTY EDUCATIONAL SERVICE AGENCY BONDING PROPOSAL

Shall Midland County Educational Service Agency, State of

Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Seventeen Million Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$17,070,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefore, in one or more series, for the purpose of:

erecting, furnishing, and equipping an addition to, and remodeling, improving, furnishing and refurbishing, and equipping and re-equipping, the Sugnet Building; purchasing and installing information technology systems, together with equipment and software, at the Sugnet Building; preparing, developing, equipping, and improving driveways, parking areas, and the site at the Sugnet Building; and replacing the roof at the Longview Early Childhood and Family Center?

The following is for informational purposes only:

The estimated millage that will be levied for the proposed bonds in 2022 is .5 mill (\$0.50 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation). The maximum number of years the bonds of any series may be outstanding, exclusive of any refunding, is twelve (12) years. The estimated simple average annual millage anticipated to be required to retire this bond debt is .47 mill (\$0.47 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation).

(Pursuant to State law, expenditure of bond proceeds must be audited and the proceeds cannot be used for repair or maintenance costs, teacher, administrator or employee salaries, or other operating expenses.)

BRECKENRIDGE COMMUNITY SCHOOLS OPERATING MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance and renews millage that will expire with the 2022 tax levy.

Shall the currently authorized millage rate limitation of 18 mills (\$18.00 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Breckenridge Community Schools, Gratiot, Midland and Saginaw Counties, Michigan, be renewed for a period of 10 years, 2023 to 2032, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2023 is approximately \$1, 152,518 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2022 tax levy)?

SHEPHERD PUBLIC SCHOOLS OPERATING MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance. The remaining 2.6913 mills are only available to be levied to restore millage lost as a result of the reduction required by the "Headlee" amendment to the Michigan Constitution of 1963 and will only be levied to the extent necessary to restore that reduction. Isabella, Gratiot and Midland Counties, Michigan, be renewed by 20.6913 mills (\$20.6913 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a

period of 7 years, 2023 to 2029, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 18 mills are levied in 2023 is approximately \$1,190,617 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2022 tax levy)?

SAGINAW INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL DISTRICT SPECIAL EDUCATION MILLAGE PROPOSAL

This proposal will increase the levy by the intermediate school district of special education millage previously approved by the electors.

Shall the 1.9417 mills limitation (\$1.9417 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) on the annual property tax previously approved by the electors of Saginaw Intermediate School District, Michigan, for the education of students with a disability be increased by 1.5583 mills (\$1.5583 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 10 years, 2022 to 2031, inclusive; the estimate of the revenue the intermediate school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2022 is approximately \$8,638,119 from local property taxes authorized herein?

COLEMAN COMMUNITY SCHOOLS OPERATING MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance. The remaining 0.31 mill is only available to be levied to restore millage lost as a result of the reduction required by the "Headlee" amendment to the Michigan Constitution of 1963 and will only be levied to the extent necessary to restore that reduction.

Shall the currently authorized millage rate limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Coleman Community Schools, Midland and Isabella Counties, Michigan, be renewed by 18.31 mills (\$18.31 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 10 years, 2023 to 2032, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 18 mills are levied in 2023 is approximately \$1,000,000 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2022 tax levy)?

HEMLOCK PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT OPERATING MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance and renews millage that will expire with the 2022 tax levy.

Shall the currently authorized millage rate limitation of 18.0614 mills (\$18.0614 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Hemlock Public School District, Saginaw and Midland Counties, Michigan, be renewed for a period of 2 years, 2023 and 2024, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 18 mills are levied in 2023 is approximately \$1,798,552 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2022 tax levy)?

Do1Thing For July- Family Communication Plan

Have the ability to communicate with family members during a disaster.

Today we have more ways to speak with one another than ever before. We are used to staying in touch with cell phones, internet, and email, but disasters can change things. These devices may not be available. Cell phone towers quickly become overloaded with people trying to reach friends and family. If the power is out at your home, cordless phones, internet, and email will not work either.

Tasks

1. Have a phone with a cord and car charger for your cell phone standing by in case of a power failure.
2. Develop a plan for how your family will stay in touch during a disaster.
3. Program In Case of Emergency (ICE) numbers into all family cell phones.


