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6	TAMI FORDHAM: I'm Tami Fordham. I work for
7	the EPA. I'm the Alaska Operations Office Director.
8	And James (unintelligible) behind me for the meeting.
9	And I'll open up, and I want to respect Father's time.
10	So now, I'm going to ask him to do the prayer. And
11	there's food here, and just pray. I know there is a
12	lot of perspectives on what we're going to talk about
13	today. And so we want to hear everybody. And so
14	Father's going to help us
15	FATHER: With the meeting.
16	TAMI FORDHAM: with this meeting - please.
17	Okay?
18	FATHER: Okay.
19	TAMI FORDHAM: Oh.
20	FATHER: Let me - In the name of the father,
21	and his son, and the Holy Spirit, amen.
22	(Singing of prayer song)
23	TAMI FORDHAM: All right. Thank you, Father.
24	So, first, thank you to (unintelligible) the meeting,
25	and making sure there's food. Erika is going to help
	Page 4

with this. She's our contractor. She's going to be
working with the - helping with the hearing, and Dan
is our Hearing Officer. So with that, I'm going to
turn it over to you.

DAN OPALSKI: Great. Yeah. So, good

afternoon, everyone. I'm - I am Dan Opalski, Director of the Region 10 Water Division for the Environmental Protection Agency. I am also a Consulting Official for EPA's Clean Water Act, Section 404C Review Process, for the Pebble Deposit Area, and as Tami mentioned, I am today's Hearing Officer.

On behalf of the EPA and Region 10 Regional Administrator, Casey Sixkiller, thank you much for attending today's public hearing, and thank you for welcoming us into your community.

Because we're still in these uncertain COVID times, you'll see that I and, and the EPA staff and contractors here with us will generally be wearing masks. We, as guests in your community, want to be careful, knowing that we've been doing a lot of traveling, and seeing a lot of different people. So obvious - we have brought extra masks if anybody else would like to do so, but just wanted to explain why we've decided to do that.

So this hearing is being convened on Friday,

	June the 17th, 2022, at the Newhalen Community Bingo
	Hall in Newhalen, Alaska, and is scheduled to close at
	two o'clock p.m. So I'll note for the record that the
	local time is 12:08. And I hereby open this Public
	Hearing for EPA Region 10's 2022 Proposed
	Determination for the Pebble Deposit Area in the
	Bristol Bay Watershed.
	This hearing is being recorded, and a
	transcript of the recording will be included in the
	Public Comment docket. The purpose of this hearing is
	to receive public comments on all matters and issues
	discussed in the 2022 Proposed Determination for the
	Pebble Deposit Area, which is available in EPA's
	Bristol Bay website.
	We understand that people throughout the region
	care deeply about this issue. We have heard from many
	people in the past. We appreciate you being here
	again today, and we are looking forward to gathering
	your input and perspectives. I want to emphasize
	today the importance of allowing all voices to be
	heard during today's hearing.
	In its Proposed Determination, EPA finds that
	the discharge of dredged or fill material associated
	with the Pebble Deposit, with the mining of the Pebble
	Deposit, could result in unacceptable adverse effects
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on salmon fishery areas in certain waters within the Bristol Bay watershed. To prevent these unacceptable adverse effects, EPA is proposing to prohibit the discharges of dredged, or fill material into waters of the United States identified in the Pebble Limited Partnership's 2020 Mine Plan, within the portions of the mine's site footprint that are located in the South Folk Koktuli, and North Folk Koktuli watersheds.

EPA also is proposing to restrict discharges of dredged or fill material associated with future plans to mine the Pebble Deposit into waters of the United States, in the South Folk Koktuli River, North Folk Koktuli River, and Upper Talarik Creek watersheds, within the defined area for restriction that would result in adverse effects similar to those resulting from the 2020 Mine Plan.

The, the defined area for restriction is identified by the red boundary on the maps that are posted on the wall. So if you want to refer to those, please do so.

The proposed - the prohibition and restriction, if finalized, would only apply to discharges of dredge or fill material associated with mining the Pebble Deposit, and not to any other resource development projects in the state of Alaska.

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As Tami mentioned, a neutral facilitator here, Erika Britney, with our contractor, ICF Consulting, will assist with today's hearing. Ms. Britney will now review briefly, the process before we begin taking comments.

ERIKA BRITNEY: Thank you, Dan. Hello, everybody, and welcome. I'm Erika Britney, and facilitating today's hearing. To achieve orderly hearing, we have some ground rules for everybody to follow. When speaking, please be courteous and respectful. Speak clearly into the microphone. I'11 be roving with it. And being your comments by saying and spelling your name. You will have two minutes to make a comment. Direct comments to EPA, not to other meeting participants. Each person may speak only once. Please do not interrupt when, when people are speaking. And then please also hold your applause or other reactions. It can be hard to do, but applause will really reduce the amount of time a person has to speak.

And if these ground rules are not being followed, I will intervene, and interrupt testimony.

I'm going to be using my phone as a timer, and you'll hear a little chime, and that'll be your clue that two minutes has passed. We invite tribal leaders, tribal

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Elders, and local elected officials, and anyone needing special accommodation to speak first. We do not have an interpreter with us today, but for anyone who would prefer to provide comments in Yupik, we will record the comments, and include translation of the comments, in the docket. Then we will call on other commenters in random order, until the close of the hearing.

We are also offering an option to provide a separate recorded comments, away from the hearing, in the hallway here. And you will be limited to two minutes, whether you comment in the hearing room, or whether you comment over there in the separate area - but not both. You may also submit comments in writing. And on your tables, there are some comment forms. There's also instructions for how to send in written comments.

We have cards on the sign-in table that provide instructions on how to submit, as, as well as on your tables. All comments are going to be treated equally, whether you provide them verbally here, or in writing. And we will now call on commenters identified as tribal leaders, tribal Elders, local elected officials, or individuals in need of special accommodation. And you will notice that - us -

1	provide a little bit more time, since I know that
2	sometimes the English words take more time that Yupik.
3	So - all right. We will begin. And we mean
4	Yupik or Dena'ina. And I - I just want to say, if you
5	decide later that you want to speak, just let us know.
6	Right? Get a card, we'll get you in the queue.
7	So, I understand right now I have this - these
8	cards.
9	CHASITY ANELON: Um-hmm.
10	ERIKA BRITNEY: So, there you go. Chasity -
11	where are you?
12	CHASITY ANELON: Thank you.
13	ERIKA BRITNEY: And if you raise your hand,
14	I'll come. Who is
15	CHASITY ANELON: Yes, it's me.
16	ERIKA BRITNEY: Unless I'm missing anybody,
17	Chastity, and then Lisa. Go ahead. Should you start?
18	CHASITY ANELON: Um-hmm.
19	ERIKA BRITNEY: Okay. Go ahead.
20	CHASITY ANELON: So, I'm Chastity Anelon, and I
21	live here in Iliamna. Do you need me to - C-H-A-S-I-
22	T-Y, $A-N-E-L-O-N$.
23	ERIKA BRITNEY: Okay.
24	CHASITY ANELON: I have been working for Pebble
25	since 2009, and I'm very grateful to have a job. And
	Page 10

1 you come to Iliamna, and you see that there's very 2 little opportunities living here, and it's hard to, 3 you know, be able to pay for everything. And so, I have a daughter, as well. And because I've had a job, 4 5 I've been able to build a house, and be able to 6 sustain my family to live in rural Alaska. And it's -I love Iliamna. I want my daughter to do everything 8 that I'm able to do - fish, hunting, getting - going 9 and doing other subsistence stuff. But you also need a boat, and a motor - that costs money; it's not free. 10 11 And gas. Gas is \$7.69 a gallon right now. It's very 12 expensive to fuel up. And at - nobody else is coming 13 to give us jobs, so I feel like it's really important to have a job here - unless - if we don't a job, I'd 14 15 probably be gone, or living somewhere else to try to 16 work, to support my family. Thank you. 17 MALE SPEAKER: Thank you. 18 ERIKA BRITNEY: Thank you. Lisa. 19 My name is Lisa Reimers -LISA REIMERS: Hi. 20 L-I-S-A, R-E-I-M-E-R-S. I represent Iliamna Natives 21 We own 69,000 acres next to the Pebble Limited. 22 project. We support the Pebble process, and we don't 23 - we do not support EPA trying to enforce the 404C 24 Clean Water Act on us. We have done our own research 25 on the 404C Clean Water Act, and we've heard from the

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Water Act. Thank you.

Sacketts (phonetic), and the Cloree (phonetic) family that live out of state, and her - the Cloree family, they've gone to jail because they violated the 404 Clean Water Act. So that's not something we would want you guys to do here. We didn't ask you guys to come here. We choose that you guys go to places where they want this. And we think that this would imply that you go to Naknek, and Dillingham where they fish, because they dump their human waste into the water. That, to me, is violating the 404 Clean Water Act. We're tired of people trying to misrepresent They come here and they tell us they represent all of Bristol Bay - and they don't represent us. We want jobs. We want infrastructure. We want roads. We want cheaper cost of living. And EPA is not the answer for us, unfortunately. Pebble is. So we've been working with Pebble for over 20 They've been part of the community, and we years. don't see any downside to this. EPA comes in once in a while, trying to enforce laws that we don't appreciate you guys doing. We don't - we can't afford you guys enforcing laws that could cause harm to us financially. And so we'd appreciate it if you guys didn't come in to support - or to enforce a 404C Clean

1	TAMI FORDHAM: So, the way we set up
2	registration - so when you came in, we asked folks to
3	tell us if they were elected, or local officials. And
4	then otherwise - I know I've been out here, but I
5	don't always know everybody's names. So if there's
6	anyone else that wanted to speak as a local elected,
7	or official from Newhalen or Iliamna, around the lake,
8	do let me know. And if you didn't get a card, we'll
9	get it later.
10	FEMALE SPEAKER: Yeah.
11	TAMI FORDHAM: Make sure everybody's
12	(unintelligible)
13	ERIKA BRITNEY: Okay. I'll just - go ahead.
14	TERRY WASSILIE: I'm Terry Wassilie. I sit on
15	the Newhalen Tribal Council. I live in Newhalen. I
16	also sit on APC - Alaska Peninsula Corporation. 404C,
17	the Clean Water Act, if it - if it goes through, is
18	there any way that we could - if that project doesn't
19	go through - is there any way we could stop? That's
20	all I - I, I want to see that's - the 404C stop - if
21	the project doesn't go through. What's the use of
22	having 404C if we - if we don't have a project here?
23	I'd like to see that done, with the help of - I see a
24	lot of BBNC people here, or New Stuyahok people here.
25	We have a whole bunch of water out here. And
	Page 13

1	our main, main, main source of transportation is by
2	water, may it be in winter, or summertime. So if, if
3	there is a way to - if that - this project doesn't go
4	through, and if this stops it, can we stop 404C?
5	That's all my comment is.
6	ERIKA BRITNEY: Thank you.
7	MALE SPEAKER: I'd like to make one, too.
8	ERIKA BRITNEY: Okay.
9	TAMI FORDHAM: Are there any other - yeah -
10	okay.
11	DAVID PARK: Hi. I'm David Park, and I'm a
12	local from Iliamna, Newhalen. And what I'd like to
13	talk about is the Safe Water Act. You know, EPA and
14	Pebble have done their homework over, and over, and
15	over again, and see how things like this won't happen,
16	'cause they know how touchy a situation this place is.
17	And it's just not about salmon. You know, Alaska
18	doesn't control salmon. Bristol Bay Native
19	Corporation doesn't control salmon. They have no
20	processors in Naknek, Dillingham - they don't buy and
21	sell fish.
22	All the fish that's provided that people buy
23	are from out of state - Portland, Washington, and
24	Oregon. And people in Dillingham and Bristol Bay just
25	hit their little recorders, and listen to all the out
	Page 14

of state people that run Alaska. And you guys, the people in Bristol Bay don't say nothing about that. That hurts.

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And with the, the jobs here - you know, there's kids that are coming back to the village, that they can't afford to live in Anchorage no more, 'cause of skyrocketing rent, fuel, and gas, and cars. And they're coming back and moving into their families, with nine, 10, 11, 12 kids to a house, plus their husbands and wives. And the problem here is not here. It's - everybody knows it's out in the ocean. But nobody cares about out there, 'cause they don't have control over the trollers, and what people catch in other countries. All they cry about is Bristol Bay, Newhalen, Iliamna, Pebble, and APC, and down the chain.

Corporations here have things that they wanted developed. And the biggest majority of people that are crying about it are the lodge owners, the canneries, because they control Alaska now. And you guys have to open up you guys' eyes and see that.

People need work. You know, we're going to the store, and we're buying less, and less, and less because of skyrocket prices, and it's everywhere. And we have the resources in Alaska. And everybody has done their

1	homework, thousands and thousands of times, just to
2	make sure everything worked. You know, we're always
3	going to have problems with things going forward. But
4	it always can be fixed before it gets worse, and
5	that's what people don't like.
6	ERIKA BRITNEY: Could you wrap up?
7	DAVID PARK: And that's what I have to say.
8	Thank you.
9	ERIKA BRITNEY: Make sure you come and fill out
10	a card later, okay?
11	DAVID PARK: Okay.
12	TAMI FORDHAM: We got him.
13	ERIKA BRITNEY: Oh, perfect. Thank you.
14	TAMI FORDHAM: David Park, Sr. Okay, we got
15	you covered. We're good.
16	ERIKA BRITNEY: Any, any other local elected or
17	tribal officials before we go to the rest of our
18	speakers? Okay. And there's food. It's back here.
19	I know it's lunchtime. Food is usually helpful around
20	this time of day.
21	MALE SPEAKER: Yeah.
22	ERIKA BRITNEY: Please help yourselves. Margie
23	Olympic.
24	MARGIE OLYMPIC: Okay. My name is Margie
25	Olympic - M-A-R-G-I-E, O-L-Y-M-P-I-C. I am from
	Page 16

1	Newhalen. I was born in Dillingham, and raised on the
2	Nushagak River, in Koliganek. So I am from the
3	Bristol Bay region.
4	I don't know if I should thank you, or be
5	frustrated with you coming in and giving us locals two
6	minutes to talk again - scheduling an EPA hearing when
7	there is a lot of locals gone for the summer.
8	First, I want to say the anti-Pebble groups,
9	fishing lodges, BBNA, and BBNC, does not speak and
L O	represent me and my family. You are coming into
L1	Iliamna, Newhalen with your own agenda and opinions,
L2	checking off a box, saying, 'Yes, we went to Iliamna,
L3	Newhalen,' wasting my time and your time.
L 4	Have you ever been in the presence of our local
L5	people working for Pebble? Have you ever walked into
L6	the Pebble office and speak to our local people, and
L 7	see their faces on how proud they are in having a job
L8	to support their families? No. You are too busy
L9	checking your boxes, and with your mind already made
20	up. And clearly, you don't even live in our region.
21	You get a paycheck from EPA, with your 401K,
22	and your full healthcare coverage. Let me take that
23	away from you, and give that to our local people. See
24	how fast you get upset when your income is taken away.
25	I can sit here and, and say I respect my land,

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my way of life. I respect my heritage. I gather my subsistence, learning from my ancestors. Today's economy needs copper. Everything we use in this world needs mining minerals. But I have already said that to you the first two times you were out here. This two minute speech is me telling you how disappointed in you, EPA, for putting my opportunity, and my local people, for employment on the line. By you coming in and rejecting the process time and time again, shows that you are not looking at both sides of the agenda, making scenarios up, and assuming what, what-ifs. Pebble can, can be the workforce engine for the Lake region. Dillingham and Naknek has always been the Fishing District. By having Pebble in the Lake area, the entire Bristol Bay can have sustainable employment. Pebble has proven to EPA that the mine plans are safe, and showed many documents to you. is time for EPA to accept Pebble's permits, veto the 404C, and get our local people to work. ERIKA BRITNEY: Tim LaPorte? Did I get that wrong? TIM LAPORTE: You got it okay. Hi.

TIM LAPORTE: You got it okay. Hi. Tim

LaPorte - T-I-M; L-A-P-O-R-T-E. And we've been a

resident, my wife and I here, for - starting on 50

years now. We've been air taxiing, for 50 years. I

1 came up here my first year as a 17-year-old, 2 commercial salmon fished in the Bristol Bay for four 3 years, and then started flying air taxi as a - well, 4 50 years ago. 5 I'm sitting here today with a - I just had a 6 back operation, fused L-3, 4, 5, and two new disks and my body - I, I've given 50 years to local, to the 8 local people, to the local love that we've had for the 9 people. And in the flying, a lot of the first flying we did was a lot of - was, was float flying, 10 11 supporting small environmental camp - or exploration 12 camps and that kind of stuff. And Sava Neland 13 (phonetic), one of the local guys here, used to, used to, every - after every fishing season, used to go up 14 15 by Shard Mountain. And every year he'd head out with 16 buckets and bags full of rocks and samples, and head for Anchorage. And, and the word was always out, 17 18 'Sava's found the big one.' 19 The same area there was being looked at by a 20 guy named Phil St. George - or Phil - St. George? 21 Yeah, Phil St. George. 1986, I was pulling his camp 22 out. And the very last trip coming out, and I - you 23 know, you kind of ask a fisherman, 'So where's a good 24 fishing at?' And they're going to go, 'That way,' where it's really, 'That way.' Well, Phil St. George, 25

1	you know, I asked him, 'So what, what are you guys
2	looking for? What - how do you, how do you find
3	minerals? How do you, how do you do this?' You know.
4	And he said, 'Well, a lot of times, you can, you can
5	see vegetation coloration differences.' And this is
6	real, documented in the - is that my warning already?
7	ERIKA BRITNEY: Yes.
8	TAMI FORDHAM: Yeah.
9	ERIKA BRITNEY: And it is.
10	TIM LAPORTE: Two minutes already?
11	ERIKA BRITNEY: (unintelligible)
12	TIM LAPORTE: Anyway, it's documented, well
13	documented in this Pebble Discovery History of - but
14	anyway, so, I, I said, 'Well, man, there's always this
15	one valley,; because we hunt in the area all the time.
16	'But there's one valley up there that's got really
17	different coloration of alders and this kind of
18	stuff.' We made a turn and went up there. And Phil
19	never said a word. But Thanksgiving, we were all
20	eating turkey - they were out staking Pebble. And
21	that, that's kind of the start of the whole thing
22	there.
23	ERIKA BRITNEY: If you could wrap up.
24	TIM LAPORTE: What?
25	ERIKA BRITNEY: If you could wrap up, please.

1	TIM LAPORTE: What?
2	FEMALE SPEAKER: Wrap up.
3	TAMI FORDHAM: It's the time to wrap up.
4	ERIKA BRITNEY: Finish - finish.
5	TIM LAPORTE: Oh, wrap up. Well, I'm a long
6	ways from wrapping up. We - Pebble - as in, in the
7	development, we saw some incredibly good years. Local
8	people had jobs. And the jobs give people a sense of
9	net worth, a sense of, of
10	FEMALE SPEAKER: (unintelligible)
11	TIM LAPORTE: of value. We started - I
12	mean, there - the groceries, the furniture, everything
13	that was being hauled in was incredible. And so
14	how'd, how'd we get from that, to where we're at now?
15	And it's got mostly to do, to do with an incredible
16	anti-movement, Pebble anti-movement. And it started
17	up at Lake Clark with
18	ERIKA BRITNEY: You've got 15 more seconds.
19	And (unintelligible)
20	TIM LAPORTE: Bob Gillam, and, and the total
21	anti-movement. You guys here right now are a product
22	of the anti-movement, whether you know it or not. It
23	comes clear down to like, Zales. `We're not selling
24	any Pebble gold.'
25	ERIKA BRITNEY: Okay.

1	TIM LAPORTE: Yeah, it's just
2	ERIKA BRITNEY: (unintelligible) If you want -
3	if you want to submit some written
4	TIM LAPORTE: There's a lot more to be said.
5	ERIKA BRITNEY: If you, if you

7	ERIKA BRITNEY: can let - you can submit
8	written comment.

2	Hearing Officer. So he's going to help us with that.
3	Nellie Williams. And then Meghan. Go ahead.
4	NELLIE WILLIAMS: Hi, there. I'm Nellie
5	Williams. I am a, a guest in this community, and
6	appreciate that the communities of Newhalen and
7	Iliamna welcome us - well, welcome visitors to your
8	community.
9	I work for Trout, Unlimited, just to be
10	transparent. And I am here, though, speaking on
11	behalf of the Katmai My Service Providers, which is
12	the organization that represents about 65 businesses
13	that operate in the Bristol Bay area, both in this
14	area, and downstream. And these members specialize
15	in, in sharing the incredible abundance of fish and
16	wildlife, and clean water, and rivers that many, many
17	people around the world come to here to visit.
18	I, I know that, that the indigenous people here
19	have been incredible caretakers of the land. And you
20	have something special that the world is very inspired
21	by.
22	Thank you, EPA, for coming here and listening.
23	Katmai Service Providers supports the proposed
24	Determination, and encourages finalizing a strong and
25	comprehensive Clean Water Act protections for the area
	Page 23

1	as soon as possible. The businesses who bring a lot
2	of jobs in the area and contribute a lot to the \$2
3	billion fishing industry rely on clean water, and a
4	landscape that's intact, and a healthy fishery. So
5	thank you, and I'll leave it at that.
6	ERIKA BRITNEY: Thanks.
7	MEGHAN BARKER: And then I'm the next one.
8	TAMI FORDHAM: Dan?
9	ERIKA BRITNEY: Oh, great.
10	TAMI FORDHAM: So, there are two, two cards
11	that I have people who said they wanted to speak. So
12	just before, Meghan
13	MEGHAN BARKER: Sure.
14	TAMI FORDHAM: Meghan? Must be Meghan.
15	MEGHAN BARKER: Um-hmm.
16	TAMI FORDHAM: Perfect. Just let us know.
17	Okay - if - let us know if there's other
18	ERIKA BRITNEY: If there's other people
19	TAMI FORDHAM: Yeah.
20	ERIKA BRITNEY: who want to speak, right?
21	So - Meghan Barker.
22	MEGHAN BARKER: Si. Hello. My name is Meghan
23	Barker. I am also a visitor here, and just want to
24	thank EPA for being here, but also the communities of
25	Newhalen and Iliamna for having visitors. I also work

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for Trout Unlimited in the Anchorage, on traditional Dena'ina lands, as the Bristol Bay Organizer. And I have the great pleasure of working with hunting, fishing, and bear viewing guides in the Bristol Bay region, who care deeply about this resource in which they work, and live. And they take time out of their busy guiding schedules to tell their visitors, and visitors to this place about why this place needs permanent protection.

And so, today I'm here to testify on, on behalf of those guides who cannot be here because it's the second week of their guide season, and cannot exactly leave their clients on, on the side of the river. But they have a strong message. And it's to please finalize strong and comprehensive Clean Water Act protections for Bristol Bay, and to do it as soon as possible.

There are over a hundred lodges and outfits in Bristol Bay that generate roughly \$155 million annually in economic output. And those jobs - those - that industry contributes nearly 2,300 seasonal jobs, equating to 1400 year-round jobs in that. And Bristol Bay is one of the most sought after hunting and fishing destinations on the planet, one that is a hundred percent dependent on clean water and healthy

fish habitat.

Guides have stood next to the overwhelming majority of Bristol Bay locals who have opposed the Pebble Mine, and now are doing it again to ensure Pebble can't return in the future. Please finalize the strongest and most comprehensive Clean Water Act protections as possible, and to do it quickly. Thank you for taking public comment.

ERIKA BRITNEY: Thank you. So, our last speaker that we know of at the moment is Jason Metrokin.

JASON METROKIN: Great. Thank you. Jason Metrokin. I'm the President and CEO for Bristol Bay Native Corporation. My last name is spelled M-E-T-R-O-K-I-N. I want to acknowledge the community of Newhalen and residents of Iliamna for having this community meeting; obviously, the EPA for, for hosting this meeting, as well. But we appreciate being welcomed here in the community.

We know that there are differences of opinion about the Pebble Project. BBNC's position has been publicly stated for a number of years now as opposed to the project. We have folks here representing BBNC, including members of our Board and staff. We attended a hearing yesterday in Dillingham. We had some folks

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online for the hearing, online last night, and we're here again in Newhalen, mainly just to support local residents in speaking their minds. Regardless of their position on the project, whether they're for it or against it, this is an opportunity for them to speak out, and to speak their minds.

BBNC will be submitting our technical comments through the, the process, and within the timeframe, to

through the, the process, and within the timeframe, to EPA. And again, we're here to listen. We respect everyone here in the community, regardless of their opinion. And I personally hope that other members of the community, like Tim, who have something to say, be allowed the time to do so, even beyond the two minutes, which I know is a rule of this hearing. But I would respectfully ask that the EPA allow folks to, to speak. So, thank you.

DAN OPALSKI: So we, so we don't have any more comment cards, or people that have written that they want to come. And I want to check that one more time. And, and if we - if there aren't others, I do want to give Tim some more time to continue with the comments he was making. So --

ERIKA BRITNEY: So the - were there other local elected officials, or others that would like to speak, and haven't had a chance to speak? Or any, anyone

else, locally - anyone that hasn't had a chance to speak? Just (unintelligible).

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NANCY LAPORTE: Hi. I'm Nancy LaPorte, the other part of Tim - L-A-P-O-R-T-E. Just, just a quick - watching the people that have had jobs with Pebble over the years - and we see it; we've been here since 1970 - we feel a part of this community. We love the people in our communities here. We have seen those that have worked, had the pride of buying things, and doing things for their family. I had one lady come to the counter one day that said, 'You know, this is the first time,' and she was working for Pebble, 'I've ever been able to go to town and ask my kids, 'What would you like me to buy for you?' It's always been, 'This is what you need.'' And she said, 'Finally, I have money that I can go in and spend.'

We saw people bringing household goods out that normally would not be bought - freezers, refrigerators, things that they needed in the community. The job market here is very poor for people having money. And as we see it, Everett's is now gone, Northern Air is gone. We're losing a lot of the transportation here, in and out of the village. It's getting more and more expensive to try to support the communities here. Gas is at an all-time high, as

1	we all know. It, it's really hard for them to make a
2	living, and for us to be able to support, and doing it
3	as low as we can on prices and that, to support our
4	locals.
5	As far as lodges, and guides and that - you can
6	almost count them on your hands, how many hire local.
7	They do not hire local people here. They bring people
8	in for the summer; they're gone. You don't see them
9	in the winter. You don't see them supporting our
10	communities in ways that our people need to be
11	supported. And we really appreciate what Pebble has
12	done in the community whenever they were here and
13	active. They were very, very present, and the people
14	that were working for them were very proud of their
15	jobs. Thank you.
16	ERIKA BRITNEY: Thank you. (unintelligible)
17	DAN OPALSKI: Go ahead.
18	ERIKA BRITNEY: Okay. Go ahead. Sorry for
19	interrupting before.
20	TIM LAPORTE: Oh, okay.
21	DAN OPALSKI: Yeah, pick up where you left off,
22	Tim, so that
23	ERIKA BRITNEY: And say your name again

And, and like I referred to, the - if 6 you don't have a net worth of providing for your family, what we've seen is, is the alcoholism, and the 8 drug addictions that, that people are turning to 9 because there, there's no, there's no net worth. There, there's, there's - it, it's really a serious 10 11 problem. And you complicate that with, with just 12 what's going on economy-wise and that. Northern Air 13 Cargo saw the writing on the wall years ago. They pulled out just this last winter. Everett's has now 14 15 pulled out. We don't even have a mainline carrier 16 coming to Iliamna, except - I mean, we're - we're, 17 we're a commuter airline ourselves, but we can only 18 hold nine people at a time. We're being dumped off 19 with, with front end loader tires, lumber, all kinds of stuff that, that had been coming in with the 20 21 mainline carriers. There's no mainline carrier that's 22 going to come back to Iliamna without a Pebble 23 project. There's three hangars for sale up at the 24 airport right now. There, there's kids that - I, I 25 mean, young families that are moving to Anchorage -

1 one way out of here. And it's - this area is dying. 2 The Lake area is dying. And, and we're watching it happen right in front of us. It, it's something that 3 is a real heartache to us, after being here 50 years. 4 5 So, you know, and I, I commented on the - it's, it's - there's been an incredible anti-movement -6 anti-Pebble movement. And it, it's very, very 7 effective. I mean, my, my feelings is - I mean, it 8 9 started out with, they're going to have a settling 10 pond twice the size of, of the Seattle - of the 11 Seattle Space Needle. Well, why, why would they pick 12 Well, anybody that goes anywhere goes to 13 Seattle. And all of a sudden, 'Crap, here's the Space 14 Needle. There's just - twice, twice the - the 15 settling pond will be twice this deep. When it 16 explodes, everything in Bristol Bay is gonna die.' 17 You know, and, and people have been lied to. People 18 in, in the Bristol Bay area here are scared to death 19 of Pebble, because they've been so successfully lied 20 And, and like I say, this, this whole product of 2.1 this anti movement is - I mean, Zales, 'We're not going to sell any Pebble gold.' For crying out loud, 22 this isn't blood diamonds. You know. It, it, this is 23 - it's - the, the anti-movement has been very, very 2.4 2.5 effective, and it's come all the way down to the last Page 31

1 two years, now they're, they're making cement, and 2 plugging all the holes at, at Pebble. 3 The Pebble Project, in my mind, is done. Well, maybe 'til Putin kicks Joe's butt and comes over here, 4 5 and - and decides, 'Okay, we're not going to, we're 6 not going to go through the EPA process to, to open Pebble back up. Just, everybody who has anything on the surface, get it off, 'cause we're gonna big - dig 8 9 a big hole.' So, I don't know if that's the way 10 Pebble's going to go or not. But the - we're, we're 11 aimed in the wrong direction. Not one of us here in this room wants to trade fish for minerals. 12 13 everybody - I, I've talked to everybody that you can 14 imagine, over the years. It can be done safely. The, 15 the, the engineering, the, the process is in 16 place to, to do it safely. But yet, you know - I, I 17 understand fish. I was a - I'm a commercial fisherman 18 from way back. And - but, but the, the exaggerated 19 results of, of, of Pebble is absolutely ridiculous. 20 Thank you. 2.1 ERIKA BRITNEY: Is there anyone who didn't 22 speak, who wants to speak? Go ahead. Oh - or anyone 23 who maybe needed more than two minutes? I do. We always have visitors 2.4 LISA REIMERS: that come in the middle of the summer when it's 2.5 Page 32

1 beautiful, and it's green, and everything is like, 2 'Oh, this is a beautiful place.' You should come in the middle of the winter, when we have frozen water. 3 You can't get to your driveway. You're running low on 4 5 This place is not so beautiful. And you can't 6 afford to pay for fuel, because you don't have enough 7 money to buy fuel. When you hear people from these lodges speaking 8 9 out against Pebble, they, they come in only in the 10 summer, four months out of the year. They charge 11 \$15,000 per person a week, and they cater, they fly They have rich people that come in with jets. 12 13 And we're just normal people, just like you. And are 14 you from Seattle? 15 DAN OPALSKI: Yes, I am. 16 LISA REIMERS: Yes. So you live in a place 17 where you have Starbucks, you have roads, you have -18 life is easy. Life is not that easy here in the 19 winter. Life's not easy at all, when you're trying to 20 support your family and trying to figure out, 'What's 21 the future hold for my kids? What's the future hold for my nieces, and nephews, and family members, and 22 23 everyone here?' If there is no Pebble, we don't see a future here. Like Tim and Nancy said, it's dying. 2.4 2.5 So we're, we're struggling with the fact that -

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why EPA is trying to come in. And the only thing we can think of is, it's all political. It's driven politically by Trout Unlimited, BBNC, BVNA, and all these propaganda that's against Pebble. They don't even have the facts. They're just basing it on, like Tim said, 'Oh, it's gonna be - the tails - the tailing dam's gonna be higher than the Space Needle.' I believed it when I first saw that - but that's not true. We've been to mines, and that's not a true statement.

We love our area. We love our fish, we love our water. This is our home. This is where I grew up. I, I drove around the two consultants here, and I showed them where we had our high school. It wasn't the building that's there now. It was a building that's partly burned. And we grew up without water, without sewer. We, we grew up - it was a hard life. We choose not to live that way. We want to live here. This is our home. We want to continue to live here. We do not want EPA coming in here, telling us what to do, with the 404 Clean Water Act. We don't want Trout Unlimited in here. We don't even know these people. BBNC never comes in here. I'm really frustrated they came in here, because we asked them to come in early on to say, 'Come in and see what's going on. See what

you can do to help the communities.' They came in when you came in, but they didn't come in when we asked them. And we're part of BBNC.

So, I'm really frustrated. And we don't know how to fix it, and you guys listen to everybody else, because everybody lobbies you guys in DC. Trout Unlimited has a huge amount of money. They go to DC and they lobby you, and you guys listen to them. And so you guys come flying in because you guys think the Natives want you guys to save us. We don't want you to save us. We don't want you guys here. We own the land here. We don't want you here at all. We already have enough hardship with what we have here. Thank you.

ERIKA BRITNEY: David Park? Yeah?

DAVID PARK: There is one more thing I forgot to say, that, you know, America and Alaska need all the minerals, and all the oil, and you know, copper and stuff that America depends on. And we are getting it from all the other countries, and we are paying way more than what we should for crude oil. They're not - they're not just asking for money. We don't see what they ask for behind doors, for us to get that crude oil. And we don't see what, you know, they need - we need copper for all the electrical stuff, and all the

1	other stuff that America wants and die - you know,
2	cries for. And we do have the minerals and the
3	resources here in Alaska. And the corporations have
4	some of the say in it, too.
5	And you know, why do we have to depend on other
6	countries that America had to spend way, so much, and
7	too much to get the product we need? That's all I
8	have to say.
9	ERIKA BRITNEY: Say your name again.
10	DAVID PARK: Hmm?
11	ERIKA BRITNEY: What's your name again - just -

13	DAVID PARK: David Park.
14	ERIKA BRITNEY: Thank you.

7	into the Kuskokwim River, affects a hundred times the
8	population base as, as this area, affects every bit as
9	valuable of a salmon and a fishery source, a
10	subsistence lifestyle. And why does nobody care about
11	Donlin? And the only base answer they can come back
12	to is, because Bob Gillam lived on Lake Clark, and not
13	on the Kuskokwim River.
14	And that's the basis of the whole anti movement
15	that - I mean, you go to Dillingham, there's not a
16	stop sign, or a car, or a building that doesn't have
17	an anti-Pebble sign on it. And, and that's got to do
18	- there's so much history in this, it's just
19	incredible.
20	You, you need to research one thing - the, the
21	warring tribes of Alaska, to try to figure out what

You, you need to research one thing - the, the warring tribes of Alaska, to try to figure out what some of the hundreds of years old culture is; why, why there's these divisions in Alaska; how Congress set up the - I mean, how did, how did Dillingham become the, the seat for Bristol Bay Native Corporation? Because

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some bozos in, in Congress decided, 'Oh, that's - the - we're going to make that the boss of, the boss of Bristol Bay.' Well, it doesn't work that great.

You, you go to - and any one of the, the, the regional corporations around here, most of 'em don't like where the, where the, the headquarters is for their - I mean, you go up to Barrow - they're the, they're the boss for the North Slope Region. You go to Wainwright, they have a lot of the feelings that Bristol Bay, and Newhalen, or the Lake area have against each other.

Congress has made a lot of mistakes over the years. But it - I guess just another comment, that - I mean, Bristol Bay Borough was formed; Lake and Peninsula Borough was formed. Dillingham area, basically the region for Bristol Bay Native Corporation and that, wanted to form a super borough. And there - here said, 'Absolutely no way. We're not going to form any super borough, because all the votes would go up or down, based on population.' And so, I got told specifically, 'You are against our Borough, we're going to be against Pebble forever.' And the - this is another meltdown result of, of what's going on with this anti movement. The Borough factors into it. And it's just - there so much history that, that puts

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1	us to where we are now.
2	But like I say, nobody wants to trade fish for,
3	for mine - for mines. And I don't think we have to.
4	So - but there's tons and tons of history that I don't
5	even have time to discuss, but it's - it's there.
6	DAN OPALSKI: So, so let me just share with
7	folks. Because we did advertise the hearing, announce
8	the hearing as going until 2 p.m., we are going to be
9	here 'til 2 p.m. So, if people want to mill, or if
10	you want to get something to eat - we're, we're
