

BARBICAN ANNOUNCES A NEW CONCERT CURATED BY BRITISH-BAHRAINI TRUMPETER AND COMPOSER, YAZZ AHMED, FEATURING EMEL AND RABIH ABOU-KHALIL

Yazz Ahmed: Sarabandes and Nocturnes An evening of contemporary Arabic music Tue 13 Dec 2022, 7:30pm, Barbican Hall Tickets £12.50 – £25, plus booking fee

This December, the Barbican welcomes award-winning British-Bahraini trumpeter and composer **Yazz Ahmed** for a curated evening of contemporary Arabic music.

Yazz Ahmed draws on her mixed heritage, fusing jazz, Khaleeji music and electronica, to create a highly personal musical style.

For this special concert, she will be joined by two pioneering artists from the Middle East and North Africa, who have found a new home in Europe — legendary Lebanese oudist, **Rabih Abou-Khalil** (whose album *Blue Camel* was a seminal influence on Yazz Ahmed) and the avant-garde art-pop Tunisian-American singer and producer, **Emel**, whose soaring voice came to the world's attention when her song *Kelmti Horra* became an anthem for the Arab Spring revolutions.

Performing with both their own ensembles and in collaboration with Yazz Ahmed and the **Urban Soul Orchestra**, within their sets Emel and Rabih Abou-Khalil will take the audience on a musical odyssey reflecting their shared experience of mixing MENA sounds and rhythms to create a contemporary, universal musical language.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES

Trumpeter and composer **Yazz Ahmed** has garnered global acclaim with her own brand of psychedelic-Arabic-jazz. Her career has included collaborations with Radiohead and Transglobal Underground, and commissions for Adult Swim and New York's Festival of New Trumpet Music. Winning multiple rave reviews for her albums, *La Saboteuse* (2017) and *Polyhymnia* (2019), Downbeat Magazine named her as an artist set to shape the future of jazz over the next decade. In 2020 she won two Jazz FM awards - 'Jazz Act of the Year' and 'Jazz Album of the Year', plus the Ivor Novello Award for Innovation in Composition.

Born in Tunis, and influenced by meetings with revolutionary artists such as Bob Dylan, Cheikh Imam, and Joan Baez, **Emel** began writing protest songs on her guitar which went on to form the body of her first album, *Kelmti Horra* ('My Word Is Free'). In 2011, she suddenly came to international prominence after a video of her performing her iconic title on Avenue Bourguiba went viral, in the midst of the Tunisian revolution. Resonating throughout all Arab countries, *Kelmti Horra* propelled Emel to icon status, earning her the title 'voice of the Arab Spring'. In 2016, she performed *Kelmti Horra* at the Nobel Peace Prize Ceremony.

Lebanese composer, oud player and conductor **Rabih Abou-Khalil** has recorded with some of the greatest names in jazz, Arabic traditional musicians, classical string quartets, Armenian musicians, Fado singers and many more, with symphonic works commissioned by the BBC Symphonic Orchestra and the Frankfurt Modern Ensemble. Considered a link between East and West and recognised for the quality of his orchestras, Abou-Khalil performs with a trio strongly steeped in the Mediterranean, with

an accordionist from Rome, a drummer specialising in frame drums based in Turkey and an Albanian singer.
