AMEC's Queensland's 2024 State Election Policy Platform identifies key policy levers that will support the mineral exploration and mining sector's ongoing, responsible growth. In turn this will generate a growing royalty base, economy, employment, regional development, energy transition and achievement of decarbonisation targets.

The policy proposals below will establish a public policy setting that will embed Queensland as a partner choice and achieve:



Increased economic growth through increased mineral exploration and mining activity.



Reduces the cost of doing business throughout the State.



Ensures Queensland is a partner of choice for sourcing and investing in responsibly sourced minerals for the future.

Priorities & Actions

The overview of policy ideas below stem from challenges being faced by junior and mid-tier explorers and miners. These proposals have been consulted with AMEC members and have their broad support.



Land access co-existence

- Establish a NEW Multi-Land Use Policy
- Establish a NEW tenure solution to support the Multi-Land Use Policy
- Defining the 'responsible person' under the Land Access Code to be the landholder or the person with day-to-day management of the property
- Clearly define the rights of each party involved in land access
- Set limitations on land access decision making timeframes
- Cap land access negotiation and compensation costs
- Embed shared mediation costs
- Require title amendments only when material change is determined



Reducing Red Tape

- Set statutory timeframes under the Resources Acts
- Develop critical minerals standard conditions
- Include economic planning in the critical mineral zones
- Reform risk appetite in the Financial Provisioning Scheme
- Support novel initiatives
- Make freight and logistics accessible
- Make water management more agile and adaptive
- Review and modernise the Native Title Protection Conditions (NTPCs)
- Harmonise Cultural Heritage Regulation for explorers
- Lift the capability of assessors



Environmental Regulation

- Embed the 'state interest' in decision making
- Reform the re-commercialisation of historic and abandoned mines
- Establish a post mine land use tenure solution
- Tailings are a resource reform the waste framework
- Consult on decarbonisation policy
 plans
- Improve environmental mapping



Whole of government alignment

- Clear articulation of whole of government alignment and support for Queensland's resources sector
- Embed local procurement and mineral targets
- Commit to royalty stability
- Re-establish Whole of Government pre-lodgement processes



Safety

- AMEC to be a member of the Minerals Safety and Health Advisory Committee (MSHAC)
- Review the Minerals Exploration Safety Guidance Notice 2004
- Clear requirements and supporting tools for explorers
- Review the BoE accepted training
