
William Kelly: Allstate is open M-F 9 a.m.-6 p.m. and Sat. by appointment with additional 24/7 service via their customer care center and online.

Owner Jennifer Cantrell has owned a mobile signing business since 2018 and plans to continue offering mobile notary services if needed.

Eventually planning to be open seven days a week. Cantrell is currently working M-F 7a.m.-7 p.m., Sat. 9a.m.-5 p.m., and Sun, 1-5 p.m. She stated, "There have always been so many different convenience services and specialty products of small things that I love that I have wanted to offer my community and surrounding areas, and the opportunity has finally presented itself here in beautiful, historic Downtown Madison."



TALK TREES



The Greenspace Conservation Commission replaces up to four trees downtown per year. We love our beautiful, shaded streetscape, but trees (like everything else) do have a lifecycle. The yearly replacement process lets us limit inconvenience and impact while

allowing for the continuation of the downtown canopy. It also lets us pace the expense of installation of tree grates, which allow the tree to grow healthier and last longer. Typically, when trees are removed, the stumps are ground as the vendor has time and are replaced the following year when the planting site is more viable. This waiting period is especially necessary when a larger tree is removed as the root structure needs to decompose to allow space for new roots to take hold. Please, give us your patience as we

continue to provide beauty and shade to Downtown Madison.

In November of 1928, Madisonians voted to sell the City's power plant and distribution infrastructure to Georgia Power. The town became part of Georgia Power's grid. And this had an impact on one of downtown's buildings. In the towns that they served, Georgia Power opened stores to sell "a stock of up-to-date labor-saving electrical devic-

es." The aim was not only to profit from the sales, but also to increase consumption of electricity. The company rented the High store (129 S. Main) in 1929 and began renovations.

The engineer/architect for the project, H.H. Terhune, not only transformed the interior of the building, but also completely redesigned the façade. Inside, the space was divided into a sales and show room in the front and a store room in the rear. The front was changed from a tall, brick parapet to what we see today, a stepped parapet stuccoed and scored to mimic stone. A formal opening was slated for

August. One of the company's advertising planes flew over town distributing coupons "that were eagerly sought by those wanting a chance at the drawings" to be held at the opening.

The Grand Opening was a great success with over 1000 people visiting during its seven hours. "The large crowd was cordially received by those in charge - Mr. H.A. Price as Superintendent, Mr. Emerson George as sales manager,

and Miss Jessie Clark as cashier." Company representatives from Atlanta, Athens, and Convers were also present.

Georgia Power would occupy this space for thirty years until they constructed a new building two blocks away in 1959. In 2022, Patisserie on Main restored the storefront.


