Arizona Commission on Judicial Performance Review Announces Official Performance Ratings for Judges

The Arizona Commission on Judicial Performance Review ("the Commission") has released its official findings on the judicial performance of each merit-selected judge who is eligible for retention on the 2024 general election ballot. Detailed information about these judges can be found in the Publicity Pamphlet published by the Secretary of State and sent to registered voters, or by visiting <u>azjudges.info</u>.

How the Commission Works

Arizona has judges who are elected directly by voters and judges who are appointed by the governor after a merit selection process. Appointed judges will then later appear on the ballot for voters to decide whether to keep them as judges. To help voters decide, Arizona's Constitution created the Commission, comprised of public members, attorneys, and judges. The Commission evaluates the judicial performance of merit-selected judges through survey responses submitted by jurors, witnesses, litigants, people who represent themselves in court, attorneys, and court staff who have observed the judge at work. Judges are evaluated on their legal ability, integrity, communication, temperament, and administrative performance.

Survey responses are used to evaluate key aspects of each judge's performance. The Commission uses this public input to decide whether each judge on the retention ballot "Meets" or "Does Not Meet" judicial performance standards.

The Commission reports its decision and the information collected from the surveys in the Secretary of State's Publicity Pamphlet and on the Judicial Performance Review <u>website</u>. Arizona citizens can use the Commission's findings and data reports to be an informed voter.

Judges under the merit selection and retention system appear on the ballot as nonpartisan candidates. Therefore, a judge's political affiliation is not considered or included in the Commission's report or the Publicity Pamphlet.
