CWPB's work

- Implement two rules:
 - Agricultural Worker Protection Standard (WPS)
 - Certification of Pesticide Applicators (CPA)
- Manage cooperative agreements
- Stakeholder engagement
- ...and much more!



Agricultural Worker Protection Standard (WPS)

- The WPS is a regulation that aims to reduce the risk of pesticide exposure for agricultural workers, pesticide handlers (people who mix, load, and apply pesticides), and others
- Provides occupational protections for over 2 million agricultural workers and pesticide handlers
 - DOL National Agricultural Workers Survey (NAWS) 2019-2020 estimated that 5% of agricultural workers were between the ages of 14-19.

WPS Requirements

- Some WPS requirements also protect children's health:
 - Minimum age of 18 for pesticide handlers (people who mix, load, or apply pesticides)
 - Requirement to train workers and handlers on potential <u>hazards to children</u> and pregnant women from pesticide exposure
 - Requirement to train workers and handlers on understanding and preventing take-home exposures via clothing and hygiene practices

Mandatory posting of <u>bilingual/visual "Do Not Enter"</u> signs on treated fields subject

to entry restrictions






Cooperative Agreements: Farmworker Training



National Farmworker Training Program

Provides multiple occupational health safety training topics to the farmworker community. Projects include:

- Pesticide Safety Training for Children
- Project LEAF (Limiting [Pesticide] Exposure Around Families)
- Pesticide Exposure & Pregnancy
- Children in the Fields Campaign funded by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation
- National Farmworker Women's Health Social Media Campaign





Cooperative Agreements: Pesticide Education



PERC Pesticide Educational Resources
Collaborative (PERC)

University of California Davis Extension in collaboration with Oregon State University

- Coordinates the development of pesticide-related educational resources (i.e., manuals, videos, guides) that meet national needs.
- PERC's cooperative agreement includes a subaward program for Agricultural Community-Based Projects (AgCBPs).
 - Funds nonprofits to serve farmworker communities by contributing to the safe use of pesticides
 - Currently 6 AgCBPs have been awarded amounting nearly \$550,000
 - Third round of projects will be funded soon



<u>Pesticide Educational Resources</u> Collaborative - medical (PERC-med)

University of California Davis Extension, in collaboration with Oregon State University

- Provided resources to help medical professionals prevent, recognize, and treat pesticide-related illnesses.
- Collaborated with the Northwest Pediatric Environmental Health Specialty Unit (PEHSU) to develop the following resources:
 - Recognizing Acute Pesticide Poisoning in Children
 - Non-acute Pesticide Exposure and Child Health



Interactions with Stakeholders: Federal Advisory Committees

- 2021 <u>Pesticide Program Dialogue Committee (PPDC)</u>
 Farmworker & Clinician Workgroup provided recommendations on EPA's cooperative agreements
- Contributed to <u>OPP's 2023 response</u> to CHPAC recommendations on take-home exposures
- Recently received recommendations related to implementation of the WPS from <u>National Environmental</u> <u>Justice Advisory Council (NEJAC)</u>



Interactions with Stakeholders: Requests for Information

- Published Requests for Information (RFIs)
 - Sought input on new cooperative agreements for health care provider and farmworker training
 - Healthcare RFI: Published 9/25/2023 (EPA-HQ-OPP-2023-0457)
 - Farmworker RFI: <u>Published 1/25/2024</u> (<u>EPA-HQ-OPP-2023-0643</u>)
- Feedback related to children's health
 - Healthcare RFI: Agreement could support occupational/housing screening for pediatric patients
 - Farmworker RFI: Agreement could support training on pesticide safety for children of farmworkers, school staff who work near agricultural fields
