FIREWORKS REGULATIONS IN LINCOLN COUNTY

While Lincoln County has prohibited all sale, use & possession of fireworks in unincorporated areas, not all jurisdictions in Lincoln County have the same laws about fireworks use.

All cities and the county allow for permitted commercial fireworks displays. We encourage you to attend one of the several held every year (see QR codes).

The use or possession of any type of firework is prohibited in national and state parks, in national and state forests, on Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Fish and Wildlife properties, and on all state beaches.

The only fireworks legal for general consumer use anywhere in Oregon are those that do not explode or travel more than 6 feet along the ground or 12 inches into the air.

Examples of state-prohibited consumer fireworks include bottle rockets, Roman candles, mortars, firecrackers, aerial spinners, etc. Examples of state-legal consumer fireworks include cone fountains and wood-core sparklers. Also permitted are "novelty items" not classified as fireworks, such as smoke bombs

Regulations by Jurisdiction

- **Depoe Bay:** Sale, possession and use of all fireworks prohibited.
- **Lincoln City:** Sale, possession and use of all fireworks prohibited.
- **Newport:** Sale, possession and use of state-legal fireworks permitted; city council can pass a resolution that prohibits use of any fireworks for the current year if it finds fire risk is elevated.
- **Siletz:** No restrictions on state-legal fireworks.
- **Toledo:** No restrictions on state-legal fireworks.
- **Waldport:** Sale, possession and use of all fireworks prohibited.
- **Yachats:** Sale, possession and use of all fireworks prohibited.
- **Unincorporated Lincoln County:** Sale, possession and use of all fireworks prohibited.



**If you intend to use fireworks
keep them legal
keep them safe!**

Just because some fireworks are legal, doesn't mean they're 100 percent safe. This includes sparklers. They can reach temperatures of 1,200 degrees — wood burns at 575 degrees, while glass melts at 900 degrees (National Fire Protection Association).

- Only adults should light or handle fireworks. Supervise children at all times.
- Use fireworks outdoors on a paved surface, away from buildings, vehicles, and vegetation.
- Never pick up or try to re-light a "dud."
- Never alter fireworks or make your own.
- Have a hose nearby in case of fire and place "spent" fireworks in a metal bucket with water.
