Report on Overseas Travel: Hon Simon Watts Visit to Wuhan and Shanghai, China – Saturday 20 July – Wednesday 24 July 2024

I recommend that Cabinet note this report on my travel to attend the 8th Ministerial meeting on Climate Action (MoCA) in Wuhan, China from Saturday 20 July to Wednesday 24 July. I utilised my stopover in Shanghai on Tuesday 23 July to engage with New Zealand businesses on sustainability trends in China.

Report

- I attended the 'Ministerial on Climate Action' (MoCA) held in Wuhan, China. This is considered a major meeting in the lead up to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change's 29th Conference of the Parties (COP29).
- The meeting served as an important opportunity for me to advocate for New Zealand's climate priorities, as countries work toward a landing zone on key issues ahead of COP29 in November. I had the opportunity to engage with like-minded countries and with the current and future COP Presidencies on their priorities. Discussions focused on upcoming milestones, such as the new collective climate finance goal, and delivery of individual Paris Agreement responsibilities, such as setting new emissions reduction targets, and tracking of progress.
- MoCA reinforced the value of New Zealand's engagement on climate change, and continued expectations from like-mindeds. New Zealand has specific strengths that are valued so(a) and on carbon markets and implementation. I delivered opening remarks for the session on Adaptation, Climate Resilience & Loss and Damage, and an intervention on nature and climate change. This drew, in particular, on New Zealand experience with conservation and market-based instruments to incentivise afforestation.

Bilateral messages

- MoCA provided opportunities for significant engagement with key countries -6 hister of climate change either from formal bilaterals or pull asides. Key takeaways are below.
- China: Climate relations with China^{s6(b)(i)} 7

- Australia: Australia discussed the outlook for its bid to co-host COP31 with 8 our Pacific Island neighbours in 2026 s6(b)(i)
- **Singapore:** The bilateral with Singapore built upon earlier discussions, s6(b)(i)9
- **Samoa:** Samoa, which is currently the Chair of the Alliance of Small Island States, $^{\rm s6(b)(i)}$ 10

Business engagements in Shanghai

- The delegation's stopover in Shanghai on 23 July provided an opportunity to engage with New Zealand businesses and local commentators on the impact of sustainability trends in China, and to hear from the New Zealand Business Roundtable in China (NZBRIC) on the results of its latest business sentiment survey.
- The business-focused engagements in Shanghai included a panel discussion and dinner hosted by the Consulate-General that allowed me to signal the New Zealand Government's support to business and gain insights on China's sustainability trends.
