through Act R-114 of 2021, the Vermont Legislature apologized and WHEREAS,

expressed sorrow for eugenics policies and practices; and

WHEREAS, by acknowledging previous harms, the state has taken an important step towards

restorative justice; and

Vermont is committed to ensuring equity in our state and acknowledging the WHEREAS,

important contributions of for Indigenous Peoples to our communities.
