EL PASO, Texas – The Chihuahuan Desert Climate Collaborative (CDCC), powered by the City of El Paso, is hosting the first Climate Engagement Series to kick off the official launch of the Regional Climate Action Plan (CAP) for El Paso and Hudspeth Counties.
