H.R. 7224 would reauthorize the appropriation of \$4 million each year from 2025 through 2029 for a program administered by the Administration of Children and Families (ACF) to train health care and social service providers on human trafficking. In 2024, ACF allocated \$1 million for that program.

Assuming appropriation of the authorized amounts and using historical spending patterns for the program, CBO estimates that implementing the bill would cost \$17 million over the 2024-2029 period and \$3 million after 2029. The costs of the legislation, detailed in Table 1, fall within budget function 500 (education, training, employment, and social services).
