# **Fort Niobrara**

National Wildlife Refuge Hunting and Fishing







The Blue Goose is the symbol of the National Wildlife Refuge System, a network of lands and waters managed for the benefit of wildlife and people.



## Welcome

Welcome to Fort Niobrara National Wildlife Refuge. The Refuge is 19,131 acres, and is located along the Niobrara River in north-central Nebraska. The Refuge was established in 1912 as a preserve and breeding ground for native birds.

## **General Information**

Licensed motor vehicles are allowed only on public roads and trails as shown on the map.

Hunters may encounter bison at any time. Bison can behave in an unpredictable manner, and hunters, especially those with hunting dogs, should use caution when in close proximity to these animals.

## **Canoes and Kayaks**

Canoes and kayaks are allowed on the Niobrara River below Cornell Dam. All public entry is prohibited upstream of Cornell Dam. All River users must purchase a wristband at the kiosk located at the Refuge launch area as indicated on the map.

## Horses

Access to the Wilderness Area by horse is only permitted at the Wilderness Overlook.

#### **Hunting Regulations Table**

Hunting is in accordance with State regulations. In addition, Refuge-specific regulations must be followed and are listed in the table below.

Activity	Other Regulations
Elk, mule deer, pronghorn antelope, white-tailed deer	Hunter access is allowed from 2 hours before legal sunrise until 2 hours after legal sunset.
	State permitted archery and muzzleloader weapons are allowed for hunting.
	Use of Landowner Hunting Permits is not allowed on the Refuge.
	Portable tree stands and ground blinds can be used from August 16 through January 31.
	Permanent tree stands/blinds, nails, screw-in steps, or other items that penetrate the outer bark of a tree are prohibited.
	Game carts or any other mechanized device used for retrieving game or transportation are prohibited in the portion of the Wilderness Area that is open for hunting.
Coot, crow, dark geese, dove, duck, greater prairie chicken,	Hunter access is allowed from 2 hours before legal sunrise until 2 hours after legal sunset.
hare, light geese, partridge, pheasant, quail, rabbit, rail, grouse, snipe, squirrel, teal, turkey, woodcock	State permitted shotguns using non-toxic shot, archery, and muzzleloaders are allowed for hunting.
Badger, bobcat, coyote, fox, furbearers, long-tailed weasel,	Hunter access is allowed from 2 hours before legal sunrise until 2 hours after legal sunset.
mink, opossum, porcupine, prairie dog, raccoon, skunk, woodchuck	Shooting hours are one-half hour before legal sunrise to one-half hour after legal sunset.
	State permitted shotguns using non-toxic shot, archery, and muzzleloaders are allowed for hunting.

## **Prohibited Activities**

- Accessing the Refuge from private property.
- Use of ATVs and UTVs.
- Disturbing or collecting natural items (antlers, skulls, plants) or historic and archaeological features.
- Possession of lead shot in the field.
- Target shooting.
- Tree marking and use of trail cameras.
- Possessing alcoholic beverages.
- Camping and fires.
- Possessing or discharging fireworks or explosives.
- Use or possession of air guns, spears, gigs, or other weapons.

## Firearms

Persons possessing, transporting, or carrying firearms on National Wildlife Refuge System lands must comply with all provisions of State and local law. Persons may only use (discharge) firearms in accordance with refuge regulations (50 CFR 27.42 and specific refuge regulations in 50 CFR Part 32).

## Accessibility

## **Hunting and Fishing Regulations**

Hunting and fishing are permitted in accordance with Federal regulations governing public use on National Wildlife Refuges as set forth in Title 50 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

Hunting and fishing are allowed on the Refuge in accordance with State regulations and the Refuge-specific regulations in this brochure.

## Huntina

Hunting is allowed on Refuge lands located north and west of the Niobrara River. The River itself is not part of the hunt unit.

Hunting is prohibited within 200 yards of any public use facility.

Hunters must park in designated parking areas to access the Refuge for hunting (see map). Gates opened from these access points must be closed immediately after passing through.

Access for hunting is limited to walking and horseback.

See the Hunting Regulations Table for a complete list of species that can be hunted on the Refuge, as well as Refuge-specific regulations.

## Fishing

Fishing is allowed on the Minnechaduza Creek and along the Niobrara River downstream from Cornell Dam.

Access for fishing is allowed from legal sunrise to legal sunset.


Collecting baitfish, frogs, and turtles is not allowed.
