State Road (SR) 817/NW 27 Avenue Design Projects Public Meeting *May 12, 2022*

MIAMI, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) District Six will host a meeting, both in-person and virtually, for three roadway projects along SR 817/NW 27 Avenue from NW 135 Street to NW 187 Street starting at 6 p.m. on Thursday, May 12, 2022.

SR 817/NW 27 Avenue from NW 135 Street to Burlington Street:

The proposed improvements include repaving and restriping the roadway; upgrading pedestrian curb ramps, signs and signalization; providing high-emphasis crosswalks at all signalized intersections and mid-block crossings; installing new pedestrian signals at Opa-Locka Boulevard and Superior Street intersections and upgrading streetlights at the pedestrian crosswalk north of York Street.

SR 817/NW 27 Avenue from Burlington Street to NW 168 Terrace:

The proposed improvements include repaving and restriping the roadway; removing abandoned driveways; reconstructing sidewalk and curb and gutter; repairing or replacing broken drainage inlet tops; adjusting storm drain manholes; upgrading pedestrian curb ramps, signs and signalization; providing high-emphasis crosswalks at all signalized intersections and mid-block crossings; providing new countdown pedestrian signals at Ali Baba Avenue; relocating bus stops and trimming trees.

SR 817/NW 27 Avenue from NW 168 Terrace to NW 187 Street:

The proposed improvements include repaving and restriping the roadway; extending the median to allow U-turns at NW 169 Terrace; restricting left turns from NW 179 Street onto NW 27 Avenue; modifying driveways in some locations; adjusting storm drain manholes; widening the road at various locations to provide 12-foot minimum lane

widths; widening the shoulder to provide bicycle facilities; upgrading stormwater drainage; upgrading traffic signage and pavement markings; closing the median opening at the north driveway to the Promenade Shopping Plaza; trimming trees; upgrading pedestrian signals and signage and installing speed feedback signs.

Construction is expected to begin July 2023 and last about one year. The estimated combined construction cost for these projects is \$6.5 million.

The meeting will consist of a formal presentation followed by an open discussion. Staff will be available to answer questions in the order they are received and as time permits. If your question is not responded to during the meeting, a response will be provided in writing afterwards.
